Edited by Jane Blackall

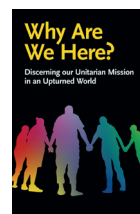

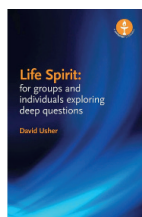
Living with Integrity: Unitarian Values and Beliefs in Practice edited by Kate Whyman £8.50

Each chapter ends with questions to prompt readers to reflect on their own values and beliefs.



Twelve Steps to Spiritual Health by David Usher £8.00

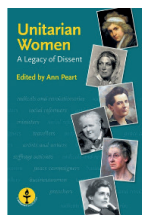

A celebration of the pioneering achievements of British and Irish Unitarian women who made a difference to their world – as writers and artists, social reformers, suffrage activists, peace campaigners, educators and politicians, preachers and ministers – for 200 years from the mid-18th century. As Unitarians, they dissented from the orthodox doctrines of their time; as women, they dissented from the restricted cultural roles prescribed for them by society.



Seeking Paradise: A Unitarian Mission for our Times by Stephen Lingwood £10.00

What might the future of the Unitarian movement look like? That will depend, Stephen Lingwood argues, on how we envision – and enact – its mission. Drawing on his practical experience as a Pioneer Minister in Cardiff, he offers a message of hope for the creation of a 'beloved community' in this world: the *Paradise* of the title.



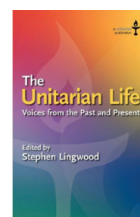
Unitarians: Together in Diversity – A Survey of the Beliefs, Values, and Practices of Contemporary British Unitarians by Sue Woolley £9.50

Unitarianism is a faith which imposes no creed or dogma on its followers. So what, if anything, binds them together? Sue Woolley set out to discover what contemporary Unitarians actually believe, and how they give expression to their faith in their daily lives. This book presents the findings of an in-depth survey which explores what binds Unitarians 'together in diversity'.



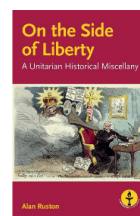
Unitarian? What's That? by Cliff Reed £2.50

This booklet is designed to introduce enquirers to the Unitarian faith by means of a simple question-and-answer format, based mainly on questions that people have actually asked when encountering Unitarianism for the first time. This edition has been updated to take account of changes in the law concerning same-sex marriage; and individual Unitarian perspectives on gender and sexuality. Ideal to give to first-time visitors.



The Unitarian Life: Voices from the Past and Present edited by Stephen Lingwood £9.99

A thematic anthology of short texts by a wide range of Unitarians and Unitarian Universalists, giving essential insights into a faith which is not always easy to define. To be used for personal reflection, public worship, and as a starting point for dialogue.



On the Side of Liberty: A Unitarian Historical Miscellany by Alan Ruston £9.50

Alan Ruston presents some of the individuals who have shaped the development of Unitarian thought over the past 300 years. From the famous to the almost forgotten, these singular individuals all upheld religious or political liberty, sometimes at great cost to themselves. The book brings them to life with distinctive extracts from their own writings.
